# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The 'Hope Collective' is a partnership cohort of organisations who share a passion to provide our young people with ambition, opportunity, something to aspire to... a hope for a better and brighter future. We aim to engage with young people the length and breadth of the United Kingdom and provide them with a voice and a platform to assist them to realise their dreams and their goals. A UK wide societal public health approach to safeguarding and nurturing young people.

Sadly, we see plenty of evidence of what happens when young people are not given these opportunities, when the concrete and steel of inner cities and a daily struggle to survive is what they face... a life bereft of hope.

As a society, we tend to focus on the negative image of our next generation, whereas, in reality, our young people are worth so much more. We believe that, if they are given a platform and the correct level of support, they can set an agenda that transforms lives and the world in which they live.

The Hope Collective believes that the levelling up discussion taking place within the adult establishment, needs to have young people front and centre of the discussion.

The more we see equal opportunity for all young people, the fairer society we will become.

We started in 2021 with that agenda, to 'change the conversation', to be more positive about young people's ability to effect change and to listen to what they think and what they say.

Report after report into the problems impacting young people highlighted the fact that poverty and inequality was the problem. Symptoms such as knife crime manifested, showing how important it was to reframe the narrative. The narrative had just stayed the same! Working with the newly established network of Violence Reduction Units (VRU's) across the UK, we engaged with our numerous partner organisations – the National Citizen Service, UK Youth, Youthlink Scotland, the Coop, Rio Ferdinand Foundation, Onside Youth Zones, Tigers, 2020 Change, Spirit of London Awards Foundation, Professional Footballers Association (PFA), NHS, YMCA Wales, Oasis Youth and many more – to put together a pilot series of Hope Hack events at which young people could attend and discuss the issues impacted by poverty and inequality. These took place in London, Greater Manchester, Belfast, Glasgow and Cardiff and our young people responded in numbers to provide their views on issues such as:

This report, which will be delivered to the political establishment in all four corners of the United Kingdom in 2022, is the voice of our young people in respect of these issues. It underlines their desire for a better, more positive, future.

But this is not the end, merely a beginning. The success of these hacks has encouraged us to grasp the opportunity and turn the Hope Collective into a constituted body. I am proud to have been asked to be the first chair of that collective body. Indeed, I am joined by Vice Chairs, Martin Griffiths CBE from health and Sarah Willis from housing... justice, health and housing working together towards a common outcome... how progressive is that?

In 2022, with wind in our sails, we will undertake a further series of hacks with the ultimate aim to build the greatest needs assessment of young people the UK has ever seen.

We are an organisation with lofty ambitions, but we need to be! We need to provide the youth of the UK with a voice and an ability for their views to be heard in shaping the society they wish to inhabit.

The Hope Collective is a powerful partnership of leading cross-sector organisations with aligned values and a shared vision; to work together in a spirit of unity to create real change for young people and communities across the UK.

Formed originally to support the 20th anniversary legacy campaign for Damilola Taylor, the Hope Collective is driven by a shared purpose – to establish real change that enables UK's most vulnerable communities to be free from poverty, violence and discrimination.

The Hope Collective will co-design solutions that deliver for young people, amplify their voices and focus on their hopes for the future. The Hope Collective will bring its networks together to create long term solutions that engage communities and influence policy making, to bring about positive change.

Through activity led by the Hope Collective, young people can discuss their thoughts and solutions on issues that affect them, their lives and their communities. The goal of the Hope Collective is to 'change the narrative' for young people and focus on solutions, not symptoms, and most importantly to focus on their hopes for the future. We do not just want to change the conversation around negative issues impacting young people, we want to change the environment and build momentum for a fairer society that gives every young person equally opportunities.


# WHAT WE DO

# WHO ARE THE YOUTH MANAGEMENT GROUP (YMG)



The Youth Management Group (YMG) is a group of motivated young people who are enthusiastic about youth representation and young people's issues. Group members are aged 16 to 25, live across the UK and represent various organisations across the Hope Collective. The group meets once every fortnight to discuss upcoming plans and opportunities within the Collective.

The YMG was created to amplify the youth voice within the project. Putting young people front and centre of the levelling up discussion in seeking solutions to poverty and inequality and all the social ills that emanate from the problem is a fundamental part of the project's manifestor and theory of change. It is an overused cliche that young people are the future but with the collective they are very much the presence and involved in every element of the partnership's work programmes. We must be clear though, that solutions to poverty and inequality are an adult establishment responsibility and the Hope Collective executive mandate is to not just listen to what young people say, but also act on what's been said.

## YOUTH MANAGEMENT GROUP WORK THIS YEAR

The YMG has been vital in the creation of the Hope Hack events which allowed young people across the country to express their opinions and solutions to key issues. In 2021, the YMG selected and refined 5 key topics that later became the themes for the 5 Hope Hacks held across the UK. Members of the group also attended each event and assisted with facilitation of the events. The YMG represented the Hope Collective at the 10 Downing Street 'Mini Hack' discussion and the Day of Hope service on 7th December 2021.

#### REAL AND AUTHENTIC CHANGE

The Hope Collective merges expertise from the developing violence reduction network around the UK, with subject matter experts from youth work, health, housing, justice, education and communication. Together they are creating an annual programme of activity that equips young people with the skills and networks to deliver change in their communities. This will enable the Hope Collective to deliver a youth led, peer-to-peer needs assessment of the current challenges facing young people, and co-design solutions to drive long lasting change.

The YMG listed a number of issues that are important to young people. These topics were refined, and 5 were selected to be the key themes of the hack events. Having looked at a variety of ways to conduct the research and views of young people, it was decided that surveys would be used as a pre-event tool and group discussions would be used in the hack workshops.

This would be the best way to accurately collect ideas and solutions directly from young people.

Prior to each 'Hope Hack' event, young people were emailed a short survey with questions relevant to the issue that would be discussed in their workshop groups.

The pre-event surveys asked open-ended questions to capture the initial thoughts and emotions of young people and were kept to a maximum of 10 questions. This ensured they were not time consuming to complete and greatly increased the likelihood of participation. Through the completion of the survey, participants were encouraged to consider how each issue impacted them and their community before attending the event.

The survey was emailed to all young people as part of the sign up process to attend the individual hack events. Surveys were sent out approximately 1-2 weeks before the event took place.

The survey was administered using

Form Assembly to complete sign up to
the event and then shared via email in
the information packs before each hack.

Please note, these responses and survey results are representative of those young people that registered to attend the 5 hack events and are the views of those that were surveyed.

# INTERPRETATION OF SURVEY RESULTS

IN TOTAL 331 YOUNG PEOPLE REGISTERED TO ATTEND THE EVENTS, WITH 219 COMPLETING THE SURVEYS, GIVING AN OVERALL RESPONSE RATE OF 66%.

In Manchester, the topic of the hack was Wellbeing. We asked 'What do you think are the top two or three mental health issues affecting young people in Britain today?' (respondents were asked to select their top two or three issues.)

# HOPE HACKS

The hope hack event format was designed and developed by the National Citizen Service (NCS) events team, also part of the Hope Collective Operations group. The team had aspirations for the events to mirror a traditional 'hackathon', whereby a desired goal is achieved through a design sprint-like event, normally taking place over several days.

With the uncertainty around Covid restrictions, time, budget and resource, the team wanted to achieve a similar outcome to a 'hackathon' but within a much shorter time frame, of 7 hours. Set out to achieve a similar format, the NCS events team connected with an organisation called 'Liminal Labs' who had run similar virtual workshop sessions during lockdown.

The events team asked Liminal Labs specifically for ideas for creating a space in which young people could be invited to share, explore and develop ideas to tackle issues affecting them and their communities, and so the format of the Hope Hack events was developed.

Each Hope Hack event followed a similar structure. At the start of each event, the audience heard from an inspirational speaker followed by a panel of influencers and young people discussing the event topic, followed by an opportunity for questions and open conversation from the audience of young people.

The hack style workshops followed on from the inspirational session and consisted of several phases, outlined on the next page.





#### **RESEARCH WALL**

This was an area at the start of the hack to provide information, reflection and inspiration. The team decided on a 'washing line' approach, with posters highlighting inspiring projects, key quotes, statistics and research to build the research wall for participants to explore, share and talk about their hopes and fears surrounding the hack topic.



#### **IDEATION PHASE**

Following the research wall, was a fast paced, high energy ideation round, using lots of post it notes!
Undertaking ideation in rounds allowed participants to build on ideas to make them more ambitious, thoughtful and impactful. The aim was to encourage quantity not quality, and ideas from which to explore further.

## PRIORITISING IDEAS

Using a prioritisation matrix helped the team decide which ideas they wanted to take forward using measures such as 'potential impact' and 'length of impact', with the idea to pick one or two ideas that they were most passionate about or interested in building on further.




## IDEA DEVELOPMENT

Using a variety of methods, eg. storyboards, journey-mapping, role play, posters, the teams then worked together to decide which idea to take forward to present back to the main audience. This was done in a number of creative ways including role play, acting, music, singing and use of props such as posters.

These hack events have allowed young people a voice in the way issues that predominantly affect them are addressed, and to "change the conversation".

The inspirational session in the morning really set the scene and energy for the Hope Hack workshops, where the young people felt comfortable discussing with their peers, key issues in their communities and their solutions for positive change.





## EDUCATIONAL REFORM

#### HOUSING

For the fourth Hope Hack, we visited Glasgow where this time the discussions were around the environment and housing. Solutions and ideas from the young people included converting empty offices to housing, using more green spaces to grow own produce and more use of solar panels and electric cars.

"Housing and equality is not taught in school. We should be writing essays and taking part in creative projects and being educated on topics such as housing and the environment. Our education system is outdated. It's old and does not give us space for open discussions of the acknowledgement of development of any young people's opinions. Events such as this, are amazing and important, but it shouldn't take this for us to learn about this. We should be taught about this in school."

"In History lessons, we don't learn about topics such as the Civil Rights movement, until exam years, even though it is important. Many people who don't take history, never really learn about these topics"

"Real impact, comes from real people."



"I would like to thank everyone who made today happen, for allowing our voices to be heard and for inciting such passion for change within us."



"A system based on equality is the only system that can produce quality. I am hopeful today, as I have seen the progress over the last years. The rapid rate of change and a sign of better times to come. I am hopeful today, because we can still work towards a better, greener, world."

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I had the pleasure and privilege of attending three of the five hacks that took place in 2021 however, I would have to say that one of my highlights was during the first hack in London where the topic was on poverty and inequality. It was very inspiring and refreshing to see how all the attendees engaged with the topic and presented very engaging points throughout the session. Sadiq Khan attended the uplifting memorial service on 7th December in memory of Damilola Taylor.



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The Hope Collective has now become a constituted organisation and in 2022 it will roll out the Hope Hacks to every Violence Reduction Unit region in the country.

Setting out to achieve the biggest needs assessment of what young people think a fairer society looks like and to allow young people to be major stakeholders in the levelling up discussions.

The ongoing work with the VRU's and youth organisations alongside support from an academic partner will add rigour to the final report we publish early in 2023.

The solutions to the violence impacting young people is extremely complex but every report or commission ever assembled has highlighted poverty and inequality as the primary causal factor and main driver.

A society approach to better understanding the infrastructure and cohesive programmes required to tackle the problem, would be a great start in finding solutions.



# CLOSING REMARKS

Over the past year, it has been incredible to be part of this journey turning the idea of Hope Hacks into a reality.

Getting involved has been a memorable experience so far. I have enjoyed working behind the scenes and travelling around the UK attending the events I helped to organise. The combined effort of everyone who has worked on this report, and the wider campaign, has been vital in helping us to empower young people across the UK.

Young people may sometimes struggle to have their voices heard, but we continue to see the difference that can be made when we value their opinions and ideas. This is especially important when searching for solutions to key issues that affect them and our society.
